An average of 85 tramps per night lodge in Princeton.

Examinations, closing the First term, commenced in the College yesterday.

Mrs. Sullivan is, as we go to press, again being arraigned before the Mayor for selling liquor without a license.

Robert B. Stockton, grandson of the late Commodore Stockton has been appointed Special Treasury Agent at Philadelphia.

Henry Hunt, a workman at the cash and blind factory at the basin, had the forefinger and thumb of his left hand badly lacerated by a circular saw, on Thursday morning.

Rev. William M. Taylor, D.D., of New York City, will preach the next sermon in the series before the Seminary on Sunday evening. He is expected likewise to occupy the pulpit in the chapel of the Seminary in the morning.

Two of the Brooklyn churches have been consolidating and they have settled Dr. Vandyke, well known in Princeton as a preacher and counsellor, as the Pastor of the United bodies, on a salary of \$6,000.

A Jury trial took place on Wednesday before Justice Mount. The parties to the complaint were Adolphus Emmons and Mr. McQuade. The case was a suit of ejectment. The jury were locked up the greater part of the day, but failed to agree, and were discharged, standing it is said seven to five. J. F. Hazenman, Jr., was counsel for the plaintiff and R. Ranyan for the defendant.

A change has taken place this week in connection with the Telegraph office. Mr. T. D. Parvin, who has been the operator for about two years past, has gone to Philadelphia to take charge of an office there. He leaves behind him a host of friends who follow him with their good wishes for his future prosperity. Mr. H. A. Shinn formerly an operator at Gloucester in this State has taken the place of Mr. Parvin.

Mr. D'Orsay, has given up the contract for enlarging the First Church, financial embarrassment having made it impossible for him to continue the work. The building committee, we hear, have released him from his engagements, and will either give out new contracts for the remaining work, or have it done by day labor, under their supervision. What remains to do, is to erect the side walls, place the doors and windows on the new parts, put in the new windows, paint the interior wood work, and clean up the grounds generally.

Rev. John Miller of Princeton in Thursday's Tribune joins issue with ex-Speaker Blaine and a host of his backers, and with other still newer expressions of President Grant, on the Free Common School question. Mr. Miller is opposed to the whole system of State education. The Catholic does not want the Bible. The Protestant does want it. And there is no reconciling these bodies says he except by sweeping away State Schools altogether. If we understand the Reverend gentleman, his voice is "Officers of the civil compact you are a police, stick to your office; and let the people regulate the intelligence and training question every one to suit himself."

We have received a circular from the Secretary of the Executive Committee of the N. J. Sunday School Association, addressed to Pastors, Sunday School Workers and Friends. We are unable to publish it entire; but must content ourselves with presenting the substance of it, which is that the Sunday Schools of the State ought not to be closed in Winter. Love to the Master and to the Souls of the little ones, the example of Christ and the success of winter schools are urged as so many reasons for not discontinuing them. We commend the matter to all concerned as worthy of very attentive consideration.

An Entertainment will be given in the Second Presbyterian Church, one week from this evening, by Mrs. E. A. Taylor of New York. It will consist in Dramatic Readings. Mrs. Taylor comes to Princeton invited by the Press of the Country, and by distinguished individuals of taste and judgment, as an artist first class in her line. She is spoken of as taking rank by the side of such women as Charlotte Cushman and Mrs. Scott Siddons. This is sufficient praise; enough to insure her a full house, and appreciative hearing. We have not space to present any of the numerous flattering testimonials to her character and genius which have been shown us. Some of these have

been published in a circular, and will be distributed among our Citizens before the 18th, the night of the Readings. Mrs. Taylor's entertainment is given, we understand, under the auspices of some of the Students of the College. We hope there will be a large gathering. It will be for the Students and their Friends, as also for our Citizens generally, a fitting winding up of the College term previous to the Christmas vacation which commences on the Tuesday following.

The Misses Grenelle assisted by Miss Bennett of Bordentown, gave an entertainment on Thursday evening in the Baptist church on Canal St. Miss Jenny recited several pieces, of great variety, in corresponding style, with seemingly perfect elocution. Tune, emphasis, inflection, mimicry, range of voice, passion, gesture were complete. Miss Nettie sang beautifully, given great satisfaction to the audience. The bad weather, and almost impassable roads, made the attendance quite small.

On Sunday morning a colored woman, named Susan Thompson, of middle age or past, residing in a house belonging to Madame Sullivan, and living there alone was found dead in her room. She had apparently risen that morning and proceeded to light a fire when it was thought she fell struck with disease of the heart and almost instantly died. Coroner Mount viewed the remains; but circumstances were such that it was not thought necessary to hold an inquest.

An accident occurred to the News train on Tuesday morning whereby we were deprived of the usual New York newspapers. The train in the neighborhood of Bergen Cut ran into a freight train coming in the opposite direction, which had just jumped the track. No lives were lost but the engineer was somewhat injured. One of the wheels of the engine became imbedded deep in the earth. A delay of about five hours was occasioned.

We are pleased to learn that Dr. Macdonald proposes to give a lecture in aid of the First Church in liquidating the expense incurred in the alterations, and refitting of their house. The subject of the lecture will be "The Poetry of the Bible," an improving and interesting theme, which will be well worthy the attention of all, and by attending which personal profit and entertainment may be reached as well as the society benefited. The lecture will be delivered next Tuesday evening in the Second Church. We trust the Doctor will be greeted by a large house, and that the hearts of the ladies will be made glad by a worthy addition to their means for beautifying and rendering attractive the house of God. The tickets will be put at the low price of fifty cents, and no reserved seats. They are for sale at Marsh's, and will be at the doors. As the Doctor has labored near to thirty years for the benefit of the town, we trust that not only his own church but our citizens generally will give a benefit in turn through him to his church which in this lecture he freely serves.

Resolved, that the ends of discipline having been secured, the students so dismissed may, upon application in person to the President, be permitted to return to College.
