COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

COUNCIL CHAMBER, May 2, 1876.
Meeting called to order by President J. G. Van Dyke. Present, Councilmen Allen, Leich, Marsh, Meehan, Vandyke, Brown, Andrews, Green.

The complaint of the property owners of Mercer Street in regard to the condition of the sidewalks of said Street was received, and on motion was referred to Committee on Streets.

The Borough Solicitor W. J. Gibby moved that the appeal of James Larkins from the judgment of the Mayor, be dismissed, because the charter gives no authority to the Common Council to sit or act as a court. Mr. Larkins' counsel, J. F. Hageman, Sr., presented his views on the subject, after which it was ordered that the council go into a conference, on which the council chamber was cleared of all persons, except the members. After debate, the council on motion dismissed the appeal.
