College reopens on Wednesday. Also the Seminary.

A watch night service will be held at the Methodist Church on Sabbath evening.
The Rev. John R. Cooke of Havre de Grace, Md., will preach in the Second Presbyterian Church, to-morrow morning and afternoon.

Nassau Council No. 103 O. U. A. M. will meet next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. All members will please attend.

A handsome new wooden fence has been put up this week by Mr. Stillwell in front of the new seminary building.

Citizens are requested to decorate their houses next Wednesday, on occasion of the celebration of the battle of Princeton Jan. 3, 1776; as they did at the centennial celebration in June last.

A judgment has been obtained in the Supreme Court against Mrs. Susan D. Brown for \$2,270, the amount of the verdict in the case tried in the Mercer Circuit Court in favor of Miss Noice. The money has been paid.

Mr. Swan who has been telegraph operator for several months in Princeton will vacate his post on Monday. He is to take charge, we understand, of an office at Pennington.

Henry Dennis, who carries the newspapers for McGinniss & Runyon, will present their subscribers with a beautiful pictorial and poetical New Year's Address; in return for which he will be happy to receive the consideration they may be pleased to bestow.

The Seminary Catalogue for 1876-7 has just been issued. It shows a total of 114 students now connected with the institution: hailing from 37 colleges and 26 states and 6 other countries. The Seminary year will close the last Wednesday of April.

The pay of the New Jersey soldiers in the Continental army was five dollars per month. The bounty offered for new recruits was one felt hat, one pair of yarn stockings and one pair of shoes. Think of that next Wednesday.

We bespeak for the committee appointed to raise funds with which to commemorate the centennial anniversary of the battle of Princeton a hearty reception. About \$350 will be needed altogether. A part of this sum is already raised. More is still needed, that Princeton may not be put to shame on the day of days in her history.

We have been requested to call the attention of the authorities in the matter to the desirableness of making some arrangements whereby the libraries of the college and seminary, especially of the former, shall be open during the short vacation, and a part of the time at least during the long. There are always more or less of students and others in town to whom such an arrangement would bring the ends for which libraries are founded.

Burglars entered the Kingston Mill on Saturday night last, by prying open the office door. A quantity of flour was carried off, with a pair of spectacles and some small change from the desk. To make such an entry, directly across the street from the proprietor's dwelling, and in full view of the window, was an exhibition of boldness and address worthy of a better subject. Possibly the next attempt may be less successful, or meet a warmer welcome.

We have received the Catalogue of the Union Theological Seminary, New York, for 1876-7. The instructors consist of seven gentlemen in the Faculty, and eight Lecturers outside. The total number of students is 141, coming from 41 colleges, 16 of them being graduates of Princeton. They belong to 19 states, and 5 other countries. There are two prize fellowships yielding each \$700 annually. And two prize essays are provided for, in fifty dollars worth of books each. The library contains about 34,000 volumes.

ACCIDENTS.—The horse attached to a sleigh which Mr. Furman Johnson was driving, and containing two ladies, fell on Nassau street, on Wednesday, breaking a shaft. The horse of Mr. J. V. Day, attached to a sleigh, ran away, the same day. The sleigh was without occupant. The horse took the pavement from Mr. Marsh's drug store to Mr. Amherst's establishment, and then dashed into the road. It was stopped opposite the Nassau Hotel. No one was hurt in either case.

The annual meeting of the New York Association of Princeton Alumni was held at Delmonico's on Thursday evening. A committee of three was appointed to confer with like committees of the Alumni Associations of other colleges with a view to have a general annual meeting and dinner. Professor Lindsey was by vote invited to address the association at some future meeting on the scope and duties, &c., of his professorship.

He had just quitted family worship, when feeling unwell he asked to be assisted to bed, and died in a few moments. He was buried on Tuesday by the Odd Fellows.

The Washington Continental Guards of Princeton went down to Trenton on Monday evening to take part in the sham fight and other festivities of Tuesday. Before starting they paraded up and down a portion of Nassau street. We have only the best reports of their discipline, and general appearance and action at Trenton. They returned safely to their homes in the evening.

The Princeton Continentals made a very attractive and creditable display, and attracted much attention. Their uniform was an exact counterpart of that worn by the patriots of '76, and did much to give a realistic appearance to the battle. Their discipline was excellent. The personnel of the men is fine, and they are in every way a credit to Princeton and to the county of Mercer. They turned out forty men.

THE BATTLE OF PRINCETON.

This battle which took place one hundred years ago Jan. 3rd, will be celebrated next Wednesday. A sham fight will occur on the battle field and about town, beginning probably about 11 o'clock. In the evening there will be a history, a poem, and some addresses delivered in some one of our churches.

Ten companies at least, of soldiery will take part. Others are invited. Four are expected from Newark, one from Philadelphia, one from Elizabeth, three from Princeton, and one probably two from Trenton. Col. Drake, of Elizabeth, and Col. Allen of Newark will have the chief command. Hand-bills issued before the day will give further particulars. Dinner for the soldiers will be served at the University Hotel.

The managers of this exhibition deserve a great deal of credit, and abundantly sustained the reputation of the Methodists for furnishing good entertainments.
