Captain Scudder is having a new roof put upon his house and the front ornamental.

Rev. Dr. Gregory, President of Lake Forest University will preach in the Second Presbyterian Church on Sabbath morning.

Rev. D. R. Foster, pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Pennington, sailed for Europe on Thursday last, on a three months' tour.

The assistant bridge tender at the canal bridge near the Aqueduct was accidentally drowned last evening while bathing. His body had not been found this morning.

A party of young people from Princeton have, we are told, been camping out the past week on the Millstone above the Aqueduct.

Rev. J. L. Sooy and family will come East the latter part of this month to spend the greater part of August at Mrs. Sooy's father's, J. W. Fielder, Esq., of New Brunswick.

The Mansion House has been repainted inside throughout, the windows of the second story on the West end are to be lowered, and a verandah is to be placed over the store at the West end.

The Continental Telegraph Company are putting up a new line of telegraph between New York and Philadelphia. The wire passes through Princeton, and the Company will have an office here.

A man was arrested on Monday, and brought before acting Mayor Green, charged with being drunk. He was fined three dollars; which he paid, with the costs, and was discharged.

ORDINATION.—Mr. Francis J. Grinke, of the last graduating class of Princeton Theological Seminary, has accepted the call of the Fifth-street Presbyterian church at Washington, D. C., and was ordained and installed by the Washington Presbytery on Sunday, the 7th inst.

The Borough Ordinance against dogs is now in force. Any found in the Streets without muzzle or owner are liable to be carried to the pound, and can only be redeemed by paying a fine. If not redeemed, they will be destroyed.

COURT OF PARDONS.—The session of the Court of Pardons continued up to five o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, when the Court adjourned *sine die*. We are informed that it is not at all probable that ex-Treasurer Sooy will be pardoned, but will serve out his full sentence, with the exception of the time allowed by law for good conduct.

Extensive improvements and repairs are being made, in connection with Trinity Church and parsonage. The church is having a double row of pipes put in the whole length of every pipe for purposes of heating, a tile floor is to be laid, and the building frescoed. The parsonage is being thoroughly painted and repaired, inside and out. The late Mrs. Potter left the church \$5,000 for these purposes.

For some time past, Mr. Benjamin Gray has been engaged in preparations to put in turbine wheels in his Mill at the aqueduct. It has been necessary to make a dam both above and below the fall; and then pump out the water. This has occasioned much expense and delay. The wheels have arrived, and the mill will probably soon be running again.

The Orientals of Dutch Neck were defeated by the amateur baseball club of Princeton, on the former's grounds, on Saturday last, to the tune of 15 to 0. This is the most complete routing the Orientals ever had, as they were considered a strong country nine. They will meet the same club again in a short time, when it is hoped they will improve the opportunity and win back their lost laurels.—*State Gazette*.

Pennington Seminary and Female College Institute makes, through its Catalogue, an exceedingly good showing. This catalogue is, we should judge something of a model, in the amount and minuteness of information it gives concerning this school. Several regular courses of instruction are given, besides Modern Languages, Music, Art, &c. And the expenses are, it seems to us, reasonable. This institution is under the patronage and care of the New Jersey Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and is in a flourishing condition. There are fourteen instructors.

The Necrological Report presented to the Alumni Association of Princeton Theological Seminary at its late annual meeting has been published. It contains sketches of forty-four of the Alumni who during the past year have departed this life. These sketches cover some sixty pages, giving to each life an average of about a page and a half. Two who were the oldest living Alumni of the Seminary, and only survivors of the class matriculated in 1814, have died during the past year. These were Thos. B. Bales, D.D., aged 86 and Saml. S. Davis, D.D., aged 83. The average age of the whole forty-four was 65 years.

The Committee who have compiled this report consists of Wm. E. Schenck, Wm. H. Green, Henry C. Cameron, and Chas. A. Aiken. They have performed a laborious, just and good service, and deserve well of their brethren and the Church. Such a record is due the lamented and useful self-sacrificing men who are commemorated, it is due their families and it is a useful compend for future historians. The Committee earnestly desire from the Alumni and others early information which may be in their possession of the decease of any of their number during the coming year. Obituary notices in papers, funeral or memorial Sermons, information in any shape will be gratefully accepted by Wm. E. Schenck, Chairman of the Committee No. 1334 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

Connected with the Necrological Report is also published the Constitution of the Association and an outline of their doings at their late meeting.

This has been a red letter week in the annals of blackberry growing in Vineland. On Monday five car loads, or about 50,000 quarts of this fruit was shipped to market; on Tuesday nearly as many; and on Wednesday about the same amount, and on Thursday about 30,000 quarts. The crop this season is unusually fine, is bringing good prices, and will net little fortunes to some of our growers. On Monday Philip Snyder shipped 200 quarts, and Smith 260 quarts.—*Vineland Weekly*.

Henry Turner, aged nine years, died at Maysville, Ky., the other day, and was buried at Orangeburg, some seven miles distant. When the funeral procession left Maysville, a small hog, which the child had fed and petted, got behind the hearse, and despite repeated efforts to drive it back, followed the procession all the way to the burying ground. There it attempted to enter the ground, but a fence prevented it doing so.

A young lady, aged seventeen, died at Brighton, England, not long since, of worms on the brain. In connection with this case, it was said by one of the physicians that the popular opinion that rice meat was the healthiest is a radical error, as it is only by heat that the parasites, to which all meats are liable, can be thoroughly killed.

In Litchfield, Conn., is an old tombstone with the inscription: "Sacred to the memory of inestimable worth, of an unrivalled excellence and virtue Mrs. Rachel, wife of Jerome B. Woodruff and daughter of Norman Barber whose ethereal parts became a seraph May 24, 1834, in the 22d year of her age."

Mr. George W. Childs of Philadelphia has promised to give a building to be used as a public library and museum at Long Branch. The Rev. Dr. Lockwood of Freehold, N. J., has promised for the museum a valuable collection of Indian relics and minerals worth about \$5,000.

The mother of Henry J. Raymond, the first editor of the *New York Times*, died on the 5th of July, in Jackson, Mich., at the age of eighty years.

Three Chinese youths have gone to a Boston preparatory school with the intention of eventually entering Harvard College.

Secretary Evans has had a very neat monument made to be placed over the grave of Thomas Jefferson, the cost of which has been paid out of the appropriation made by Congress for that purpose.

The Rev. Dr. John Hall has the wealthiest congregation in the United States; yet he writes as follows in the *Ledyer*: "When the rich and influential keep away from the poor and obscure—as they do in Europe to a degree like which we have nothing here—when their hearing is superficial, when they assert themselves on all hands as the 'privileged classes,' the folly whether it be the folly of thoughtlessness or of vanity, brings in time its penal consequences. Contention follows; distrust is bred; envy and jealousy spring up; the poor become sensitive to the exercises of even just authority; the less favored come to count the more favored their natural enemies, and there is an ever growing mass of inflammable material to which the torch of an incendiary passion has only to be put to produce a conflagration fatal to both, but most grave to those who have most to lose."

In three days last week 130,000 quarts of blackberries were shipped from the Vineland railroad depots. The returns average about eight cents a quart.
